Flight Experience for Youth (FEFY) is a 501(c)(3) charitable non-profit organization that partners with Sugarbush Soaring to give young people with an interest in aviation the opportunity to learn about and experience the world of flight. With programming that is hands-on, experiential, and immersive, students achieve surprising levels of confidence and maturity—quickly. It is a thrill to see them take on ever greater responsibilities with their flying, and then to see that newfound self-assurance impact other areas of their lives. The ripple effect of young people learning to fly is simply astounding. Not only do they learn about flight fundamentals, aircraft mechanics and other subjects integral to a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) curriculum, but in truth the lessons go well beyond that.

The youth programs that FEFY supports continue to thrive and grow. In 2019, the number of Youth Members at Sugarbush Soaring reached an all-time high (27). Four of them passed Private Pilot Glider checkrides, five soloed for the first time, one Line Crew alumni passed his Certified Flight Instructor (CFI) checkride and three Youth Members did internships and helped with all facets of the flight operation.

In this newsletter you'll see what a big impact the unique programs that FEFY supports are having on young people's lives. It includes sections on Youth Member accomplishments, Youth Airport Day, scholarships, the Line Crew program, alumni spotlights and donor testimonials. It concludes with a message from Tom Anderson, the Director of Operations at Sugarbush Soaring who oversees the youth programs.

FEFY relies entirely on generous donations to fund these programs, which now have an annual operating cost of approximately \$50,000 per year. Flight Experience for Youth (FEFY) 2019 Youth Member Accomplishments

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In an effort to help make flying more accessible to youth, Flight Experience for Youth (FEFY) took on a new responsibility in 2019. It worked in partnership with Sugarbush Soaring to cover annual dues for all Youth Members (age 21 and younger). The dues allow Youth Members to qualify for reduced rates on aircraft rental and instruction, and provide them with insurance coverage when they solo. On the flight operations side, annual dues are very important because they help pay for full-time, professional staff to run the flightline and office 7 days/week, aircraft maintenance (including the two tow planes), rental of the Tower building, hangars and airport property and insurance.

Our vibrant Youth Programs continue to grow. Here we highlight the many successes and contributions from our Youth Members from this past season:

- We ended the season with 27 active Youth Members, which is an all-time high
- Four Youth Members passed Private Pilot Glider checkrides
- Five Youth Members soloed for the first time
- Three Youth Interns helped with all aspects of the flight operation, ranging from mowing grass to running the flight line to working in the office.

Flight Experience for Youth (FEFY) 2019 Airport Day

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On June 23, 2019, Flight Experience for Youth (FEFY) partnered with Sugarbush Soaring and the Mad River Valley Rotary to hold the third annual Youth Airport Day. Twenty youth, ages 10 to 16, received free glider lessons from FAA-certified flight instructors, as well as ground school and lunch. They also watched a demonstration on how to assemble a glider. Youth Airport Day aims to use students' enthusiasm for aviation as a means to make STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) studies interesting and relevant.

Flight Experience for Youth (FEFY) 2019 Line Crew

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Sugarbush Soaring's Line Crew program continues to be strong and vibrant. Ten to fifteen youth aged 13-18 work on the field under the supervision of FAA certified flight instructors and earn credits toward instructional or solo glider flights at the rate of one flight per day worked. Being part of the Line Crew is a real job, with considerable responsibility. Attention to safety, clear communications, strict procedures and excellent situational awareness are critical to the role.

Flight Experience for Youth (FEFY) covers the cost of Line Crew flights (which totaled around 150 in 2019; an average instructional flight costs \$150) as well as the cost of the Line Crew's FAA pilot certification tests, which include a written exam (\$150) and practical test with a Designated Flight Examiner (\$500 examiner fee plus the cost of the flights). FEFY also covers the cost of ground school to prepare Line Crew for their pre-solo written exams and flight tests.

Three of our Line Crew (Danny Burns, Ryan Dessureau and Nick Colwell) achieved their FAA Private Pilot Certificates for Gliders this past summer, which takes a great deal of dedication and discipline. Two other Line Crew (Silas Scheckel and Dane Liebermann) soloed for the first time. In late August/September, Nick and Ryan, two of our long-time Line Crew, headed off to college but several younger ones (who had been trained by the departing seniors) stepped in and took on more of a leadership role. One of them, Danny Burns, recently joined the FEFY Board of Directors.

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We continue to maintain strong connections with alumni from our Youth Programs, which means a great deal to us. We were fortunate to have two Line Crew alums – Alex Scaperotta and Jackson Markow - be active participants at the airport this past summer.

Alex Scaperotta

Alex Scaperotta is a former Line Crew member who is now a senior at Tufts University, where he is studying engineering. This past summer, he served as assistant airport manager, did commercial scenic rides and achieved his Certified Flight Instructor (CFI) certificate in Gliders, which is a very big accomplishment. He helped with all facets of the flight operation and we cannot thank him enough. He was truly a force multiplier, doing over 40 commercial rides in August alone. Here is what Alex had to say about his experience at the airport –

"Every day that I've spent at the airport I've learned something. Listening to and participating in the discussions about all aspects of aviation, technology, politics, and much more has shaped me as a pilot and a person. "Besides the sheer joy of flying, one of the reasons I love soaring is that there are rather few opportunities to test one's skills where one has sole responsibility for one's success or failure. Soloing in a glider offers such an opportunity, as one depends entirely on one's skills and nobody is there who could help you if you don't do well. I found this a unique and deeply satisfying confidencebuilding experience. I am, needless to say, in love with Sugarbush, its wonderful team of instructors and its incredibly beautiful setting.

Over the years I have come to admire the Flight Experience for Youth program. Soaring is a rather expensive proposition, out of reach of many young girls and boys who would fly. "My 35-year career as a financial advisor has taught me that although charitable giving can be motivated by tax and estate planning incentives it is primarily a values-driven altruistic gesture. Message from Tom Anderson, the Director of Operations at Sugarbush Soaring who oversees the youth programs -

One of the best things I do at Sugarbush Soaring is to watch young people work hard to become the best young adults they can be. A young man who graduated from our program recently told me that he had "figured out that we were not just teaching him how to fly, but also teaching him about life through flying." He is so right. Our young people are not just learning the skills of a pilot.



So many young people today yearn for something "real" as they grow up and work their way through adolescence. The youth programs at Sugarbush Soaring are one outlet that provides them with opportunities to achieve fulfilling life-changing accomplishments. Learning to fly teaches so many positive skills and lessons, including discipline, responsibility, dealing with adversity, critical thinking, problem solving, communication, teamwork, attention to detail and so many other attributes. Moreover, doing it through gliding means that they need to learn to be a team player and help with all aspects of airport operations. All our students learn about aircraft handling, equipment operation/maintenance, safety, customer service and communications. All these experiences can be extrapolated in so many ways for their whole life.

I cannot express my gratitude to the staff and members/volunteers who provide mentoring, guidance and resources for our young people. No matter how small the connection might be, every interaction helps these young people immeasurably. Our instructors provide great depth in their mentorship, role modeling and encouragement for all the young people at the airport. The FEFY Board of Directors works closely with Sugarbush Soaring and gives so much of their time and effort to make this all work.
